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Kevin Reilly Receives Washington Business Journal's 2020 Corporate Philanthropy Citizenship Award

WANADA Board of Directors
Chairman Kevin Reilly, who serves
as owner and president of Alexandria
Hyundai, was given the 2020
Corporate Philanthropy Citizenship
Award for his work with Children's
National Hospital. Reilly serves on
the Corporate Advisory Council for
Children's National, and works to
increase awareness of, and funding
for, Children's National through a
variety of programs and events.



As a board member of <u>Hyundai Hope on Wheels</u>, Reilly's commitment to community service has always been strong. Since its inception in 1998, Hyundai Hope on Wheels has donated more than \$172 million in pediatric cancer grants across the United States. Hyundai Hope on Wheels has been a long-time supporter of Children's National, and its pediatric cancer research efforts. To date, Hyundai Hope on Wheels has donated approximately \$2 million to Children's National in support of its pediatric cancer research.

When COVID-19 struck earlier this year, Hyundai Hope on Wheels and Reilly pivoted their efforts to support COVID-19 drive through testing centers throughout the nation. Given the nature of the economic downturn, resources were scarce and hospitals were in desperate need of funding.

Hyundai Hope on Wheels, with the support of Reilly and fellow board members, donated \$200,000 to Children's National's COVID-19 Emergency Relief Fund, and also provided an additional 15,000 PCR tests to the hospital in April. At a time when testing was hard to find, but still very much in need, the donation allowed Children's National to launch a testing site in

Northeast Washington that benefitted many in-need area residents who otherwise may not have been able to get tested – particularly children who are at-risk due to immunodeficiencies caused by cancer treatments.

"These funds can provide the assurance to a parent so they know where their child stands in regard to Covid-19," Reilly told the Washington Business Journal. "It's amazing to see the leadership on the part of Children's National and it makes perfect sense to support them. We wanted to get the resources to people that could put them to use quickly and efficiently. I was at the testing site myself and was amazed by the passion of everyone there. It was inspiring."

With the support of the Washington Area Hyundai Dealers, and Hyundai Hope on Wheels, Reilly has also worked to transform the Hands On Contest at The Washington, D.C. Auto Show to highlight health care workers at Children's National and Georgetown Lombardi, and their efforts to find cures for pediatric cancer. The event is now called "Hyundai Hands on Hope" and, in addition to awarding a brand new Hyundai to a contestant, awards \$100,000 in pediatric cancer research grants, in total, to Children's National and Georgetown Lombardi.

WANADA congratulates Kevin Reilly on this well-deserved honor, and thanks him for his decades of community service, which has benefitted many of the region's neediest and most-deserving residents.

Banks Must Release Paid-Off Vehicle Liens in Md. Within 5 Days, Effective Jan. 1

The Maryland MVA published <u>official guidance last month</u> that all motor vehicle-related lien releases must be filed with the administration within five business days of the lien being paid off. WANADA thanks its dealers, advocacy partners, and affiliate organizations in Annapolis, who helped promote the joint <u>House</u> and <u>Senate</u> bills that passed unanimously and which made this outcome possible.

Md. MVA Conducting Enforcement of Reconditioning Fee Disclosures

The Maryland MVA is conducting enhanced compliance enforcement of its dealer advertising guidelines, which can be viewed here.

We want to remind all our dealers in the state that "reconditioning fees" *must* be included in the most prominently listed price of the car, in advertisements and also on window signage. The most prominent displayed price may only exclude freight, the dealer processing charge, taxes, and title fees that are paid to the state, though all these charges must also be displayed prominently.

WANADA's John O'Donnell Delivers Gifts to Needy Families on Thanksgiving

John O'Donnell, WANADA's President and CEO, helped deliver dinner and happiness to some Northern Virginia residents on Thanksgiving – a day that, even outside of a global pandemic, can be quite difficult for low-income Americans, particularly those with a low Englishlanguage proficiency.

O'Donnell volunteered with Canastas de Amor (Spanish for "Baskets of Love"), an Alexandria-based charity that helps provide needy families in Latin America with groceries and other necessities. During Thanksgiving, the organization



provides needy families in the Washington region, particularly non-English speaking households, with gift baskets that are "blessed with love" and delivered to their doorstep.

Donors to Canastas de Amor give anonymously, so the recipients do not feel a sense of obligation for receiving these necessities during this difficult time. O'Donnell and other volunteers gathered at Del Ray Baptist Church in the early hours of Thanksgiving Day, and did a round of deliveries to area residents who otherwise would not have been able to enjoy a traditional holiday meal.

Push Continues to Make PPP Expenses Tax-Deductible in Next Stimulus Deal

Before Thanksgiving, the U.S. Treasury Department and Internal Revenue Service <u>issued</u> a <u>ruling</u> that expenses that were forgiven by Paycheck Protection Program loans would <u>not be</u> <u>tax-deductible</u>. This decision <u>prompted a bi-partisan response</u> from U.S. senators who hope to overturn the Treasury ruling via legislation, and make PPP-forgiven business expenses tax deductible before 2020 comes to an end.

The federal government's current funding bill only <u>runs through December 11</u>, so the best opportunity for additional tax-deductibility language to be passed into law will likely be ahead of

that deadline. <u>The HEROES Act</u>, which the House passed in the spring but has since languished in the Republican-controlled Senate, would have codified tax-deductibility status for business expenses that were covered by PPP loans.

On Tuesday, a bi-partisan group of congressional members <u>proposed a \$908 billion compromise bill</u> that is far short of the trillions in spending that the HEROES Act contained, but almost double the size of the bill that Senate Majority Leader <u>Mitch McConnell countered with</u> later in the day.

It is unclear if the bi-partisan proposal would include tax-deductibility for forgiven expenses (it appears that Sen. McConnell's proposal does not), but any legislation would likely need to clear the Senate Finance Committee, whose chairman and ranking member authored the letter advocating for a legislative fix that ensures forgiveness.
